

Dear Parishioners and Friends of our parish, we are so happy that you could join us today to celebrate the 4th Sunday in Ordinary Time.

We could summarize all of the beatitudes by saying that blessed are those who know that they are not God, and who live out of that knowledge. Now I know that none of us would ever claim to be God. But when we find ourselves living only out of our own wit and wisdom, and never really seriously bringing God into all of our decisions and actions, then we may not say we are God, but we act that way. But the truth is that we are not the masters of our own fate, nor are we the captains of our own souls. We belong to God and totally depend on God for everything. That is the ultimate and final truth of life.

It is in the light of that profound truth that we are asked to live our lives in all of their flesh and blood detail. As well as belonging to God, we also belong to all those others who belong to God. Those who are poor in spirit know that they live in a world where they must be open to entering into the lives of others. They are gentle with others,

mourn with them, want what is just and right for them, are merciful towards those who need mercy, work for peace and are not afraid to stand up for what is right. The poor in spirit know they are not complete in themselves.

They need God and they need others, and they live their lives being open to new possibilities. I would like you to listen to the words of a recovering addict. "As I become increasingly willing to accept mystery and uncertainty in my walk with God, I find that I am more and more amazed by (God). Even in the face of my continued foolish defiance, the Triune God is relentlessly, but lovingly, taking away the satisfaction which comes from lesser gods.

He is leading me to live in the intersection of my own imperfection and His awesome mercy, grace, and love." (Gary, a recovering addict.)

2nd February – The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord



This feast day celebrates both the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple, as well as the Purification of Mary, which was required by the Mosaic Law forty days after the birth of a child. The Church celebrates the feast of the Presentation of the Lord, also called Candlemas for the custom of using lighted candles. In Luke's account, Jesus was welcomed in the temple by two elderly people, Simeon and the widow Anna.

They embody Israel in their patient expectation; they acknowledge the infant Jesus as the long-awaited Messiah. On this day, we also reflect on the gift of consecrated life. While the momentary satisfaction of selfish living ultimately leads to emptiness, living a life of holiness, dedicated to God's service, will give true contentment and peace.

As Pope Francis has expressed: Consecrated life is born and reborn of an encounter with Jesus as he is: poor, chaste and obedient... And while worldly life soon leaves our hands and hearts empty, life in Jesus fills us with peace to the very end, as in the Gospel, where Simeon and Anna come happily to the sunset of their lives with the Lord in their arms and joy in their hearts
