PARISH MOTTO - 'THE BEST IS YET TO COME'

12th Sunday of the Year 25th of June 2023



Dear Parishioners and Friends of our parish, we are so happy that you could join us today to celebrate the 5th Sunday in Ordinary Time.

An essential part of our spiritual journey is discovering how much of our life is run by fear and how much is run by love. Our awareness of this part of ourselves is a major step on our spiritual road. Maybe you could set aside one day in which you ask yourself this question each time you are about to do anything: Am I doing this out of fear or out of love? So before you get out of bed ask yourself: Am I getting up out of fear or out of love?

In other words, am I getting up because I am afraid of being late for work, or afraid that people will call me lazy, or afraid that my family will think less of me if I don't get up? Or am I getting up because I love my family and I am

working to help them live a comfortable and human life? Am I getting up because I have been given certain gifts by God and wish to use them in my daily work, whether that work is outside the home, or whether that work is in the home, taking care of the house and my family? Your getting out of the bed doesn't look any different to someone who would be watching you, but there is a great difference in getting out of bed because you are motivated by fear or because you are motivated by love. Can you see the great difference there could be in a person's life if you attempt to change the motivation from fear to love?

The change in your life would be enormous. If you ask this same question before everything you do, then the awareness that comes to you can be a great insight. Yes, even if at first you don't change your motivation from fear to love, at least the awareness of why you are doing what you are doing will give you the chance to gradually change your motivation. And eventually, you will be running your life more on the fuel of love than on the fuel of fear. In our Gospel passage today Jesus tells us three times not to be afraid. And the reason he gives us for not being afraid is this: You are of more value than many sparrows.

The Father is saying to each of us: You are very valuable to me. I will take care of you. Isn't this what we say to our children: Don't be afraid, I'll take care of you? In the first reading the prophet Jeremiah is proclaiming that even though things are going very bad for him-he is being mocked and plotted against by his enemies – he still calls the Lord the one who will deliver him from the hands of evildoers. We are called to trust and be faithful to God, no matter what, because God will be faithful to us. Seeking to know God better, John Chrysostom became a hermit in the mountains near Antioch in A.D. 373.

Although his time of isolation was cut short by illness, he learned that with God at his side, he could stand alone against anyone or anything. That lesson served Chrysostom well. In A.D. 398 he was appointed patriarch of Constantinople, where his zeal for reform antagonized the empress, who had him exiled. Allowed to return after a short time, Chrysostom again infuriated the empress, who sent him away again. How did Chrysostom respond to such persecution? "What can I fear? Will it be death? But you know that Christ is my life, and that I shall gain by death. Will it be exile? But the earth and all its fullness are the Lord's. Poverty I do not fear; riches I do not sigh for; and from death I do not shrink." This saint had given his life completely over to the love of God and so fear was driven out of his heart. In the first letter of John we read that "fear is the enemy of love".

One will drive the other away. Too much fear will drive love out of our hearts. On the other hand, the person who gives his or her life over to love will gradually see that fear no longer rules their life. Fear keeps us tied up in knots. We are always on the lookout for the disapproval of people, thinking that if we step out of line even a little, someone will be there to correct us or to criticize us.

Can you see how this fear keeps us from loving? It keeps us as prisoners to the reactions of others. Our freedom disappears or is diminished. Instead of having the God of Love as our master, we become slaves to the thoughts and opinions of other people. The God of Love does not want our obedience only out of fear. God wishes us to be free – to love freely because when we do so, we are most like God, the one who is completely free. Jesus has freed us from slavery to fear. May we all claim that freedom.

What is a Peter's Pence collection?

Peter's Pence (or Denarii Sancti Petri and "Alms of St Peter") are donations or payments made directly to the Holy See of the Catholic Church. The practice began under the Saxons in England and spread through Europe. Both before and after the Norman conquest the practice varied by time and place:

initially, it was given as a pious contribution, whereas later it was required by various rulers and collected like a tax. Though formally discontinued in England at the time of the Reformation, a post-Reformation payment of uncertain character was seen in some English manors into the 19th century. In 1871, Pope Pius IX formalized the practice of lay members of the church and "other persons of good will" providing financial support to the Roman See. Modern "Peter's Pence" is a worldwide collection that supports the activities of the Holy See through which Pope Francis governs the Church and exercises his charitable works. When used for charitable outreach, funds from this collection help those most in

May we heed this call, allowing God's spirit to reshape us as vessels of His grace and messengers of His love, ensuring our churches come alive with renewed vigor, passion, and purpose.
